William Rankine – an Appeal

William Rankine was one of Scotland's great engineers and scientists. He was the co-founder of our own esteemed Institution. Rankine's untimely death at the age of fifty-two was greatly mourned by scientists and engineers around the world. It is sad to report that the gravestone of this great man lies broken and forgotten in Sighthill Cemetery, Glasgow.

IESIS are launching an appeal to fund the re-instatement of the stone to honour the memory of this great man and all he achieved. We would be most grateful if you could contribute a few pounds, it is hoped to carry out this work in 2020, the 200th anniversary of Rankine's birth.

The Selection Panel for the Scottish Engineering Hall of Fame held it's first meeting (online!) on 18th March in Glasgow. The group discussed nominations sent in from the public as well as those already on their 'list'.

A follow up meeting will be held in early summer to select this year's inductees.

FemEng in Malawi





For the past four years, a team of students from the Female Engineering society, FemEng, at the University of Glasgow has travelled to Rwanda to promote engineering to children through outreach workshops and talks. After working closely with students at the University of Rwanda, we have reached over 6000 children and created a sustainable impact. As their next step, they are starting a new, exciting project, FemEng in Malawi. This project is a partnership between the University of Glasgow and the Malawi University of Science and Technology, bringing together students to find creative ways to encourage and educate more young people towards STEM fields.

The work of their previous project, FemEng in Rwanda, has been recognised within the Scottish Parliament, in national newspapers and within the University of Glasgow. Over the course of four years, the impact left by the team managed to reach over 6000 children in Rwanda. As more children were given the opportunity to learn about further education, applications to STEM subjects at the University of Rwanda have increased by over 50%. The University of Rwanda has now formed their own FemEng society, 'Future You', which is continuing to promote STEM subjects in their country.

The Rankine 2020 Conference Advances in Cooling, Heating and Power Generation



Glasgow 26th-29th July 2020 This conference will explore the legacy of William Rankine, looking at his ground-breaking research to see what modern engineering can learn from this great Victorian innovator. It will also look to the future and offer a forum where the disciplines of power generation, refrigeration, air conditioning, and heat pumps come together to discuss their common challenges and learn about the solutions that are being developed to tackle them. IESIS Vice President, Andy Pearson, is a lead organiser for this event.

The Watt Institution, Greenock

The Major Refurbishment & Re-Opening of The Watt Institution (shortlisted for RIAS/RIBA Awards 2020), Greenock by Inverclyde Council (The McLean Gallery) on Wednesday 20th November 2019

The Opening of the refurbished McLean Museum & Art Gallery, now re-linked through to the Watt Library, and all renamed the "Watt Institution", in this the 200th Anniversary of Watt's passing, was attended by Ian Arbon, Gordon Masterton, Nina Baker, Karen Dinardo and others of IESIS.

Inverclyde Council hosted the super event, which commenced with a welcome in the Watt Institution Hall, with songs on Watt crafted and sung by local schoolchildren. The exhibition space is fresh and modern with the extremely interesting artefacts, and the "blocked up" door from years ago has been opened into the Reference Library with the superb seated Watt Statue and subtle and warm hues, textures and display items.



Everyone present was very impressed.

The Council then hosted an excellent Celebration Dinner, where special thanks to Curator Val Boa were given for her endeavours with her colleagues, to achieve the E2M refurbishment project. Greenock Town Hall in all its splendour was revealed, with the Dinner hosted by the Provost, in the historic Masonic Hall with its Corinthian columns and stained glass windows. The Guest Speaker was Professor Colin MacInnes who presented James Watt's Impact on the Modern World in a most entertaining manner, and the Provost Brennan's humour and warmth came over to the company in his address, in which Val Boa and her colleagues were recognised.
